

# How to Pack an Emergency Kit for Any Outdoor Adventure

Post-Packing Setup Guide to Build a Compact, Ready-for-Anything Outdoor Kit

## CORE SURVIVAL ITEMS

### Always Start with These Unskippables

- Multi-tool or compact knife with built-in functions.
- Portable water filter or purification tablets (backups welcome).
- Firestarter: waterproof matches, lighter, or spark rod.
- Energy bars or calorie-dense snacks in vacuum-sealed packs.

## SHELTER & WARMTH ADD-ONS

### Protection from Weather and Exposure

- Emergency foil blanket or ultralight bivy sack.
- Compact poncho or plastic tarp with cordage.
- Heat-reflective ground sheet or sit pad.
- Packable beanie, gloves, or neck warmer for sudden drops.

## SIGNAL & COMMUNICATION TOOLS

### Let Others Know Where You Are

- Whistle, signal mirror, or LED blinker beacon.
- Phone battery bank with stored offline maps.
- Paper map + marker pen in a waterproof sleeve.
- Basic ID card, itinerary note, or contact backup info.

## HYGIENE, FIRST-AID & ESSENTIALS

### Keep Yourself Stable, Safe & Comfortable

- Mini first-aid kit: bandages, ointments, allergy tablets.
- Biodegradable wipes or compressed towel tabs.
- Travel toothbrush, lip balm, and tissue pack.
- Personal meds stored in labeled waterproof pouch.

## ADAPT FOR YOUR TERRAIN

### Tweak for Season, Altitude, or Trip Length

- Add traction aids or sunscreen depending on region.
- Use zip-top bags or dry sacks to organize by category.
- Pack one backup clothing layer (base or shell).
- Always leave 10-15% space for last-minute needs.

### Flexible Prep You Can Actually Carry

- Covers essential needs without overpacking your bag.
- Works for solo trips, day hikes, or backcountry detours.
- Fits into most small backpacks or hydration packs.
